"Colonials 76" an Independence day play was presented on July 8, and concluded the second weeks of special camp events.

The play written by Wayne Towne and produced by Wally Tomchek, presented a candid spotlight of some twenty two characters portraying early American history.

Patterned on a "You Are There" format, Jimmy Weinstein and his cast revealed a reflective era of the early colonists, a barage of historical quotations cautiously sprinkled with comic relief.

A stark setting - a backdrop of the colors was enhanced by impressively costumed characters.

FROM THE EDITORS CAMPERS CORNER

At the begining of each new week during the Waupaca Camp season, Skipper and his staff meet to determine programing and progress schedules.

The staff also determines which boys have merited the achievement of honor boy or honorable mention.

In order to attain this privilege campers are judged by their own cabin counselor and by all who work with them.
