

AT WAUPACA — We have one of the finest locations in Wisconsin: Seventy-one acres of beautiful land, wooded and well drained. A thousand feet of shoreline on a clear spring-fed lake, well stocked with fish. Two hundred miles from Chicago. (about 4½ hours' drive on excellent highways) Seven miles from Waupaca, Wisconsin, a town of 4,000 people.

STAFF — Our staff is mature. It includes men with teaching experience and advanced degrees as well as recent college graduates and college students. Their areas of specialization are music, arts and crafts, liberal arts, science, and physical education.

PROGRAM — A fine balance between physical and other creative and educational activities is maintained throughout the day. All campers, regardless of their respective levels of achievement, are given the opportunity to participate on teams and to perform. There is a wide choice of classes and fun.

HOUSING — Living accommodations are sturdy and comfortable. Cabins are double-floored, insulated buildings with washrooms and showers. Facilities are modern and convenient: hot and cold water, flush toilets, electric lighting.



BOATING, CANOFING, AND SAILING are taught. All safety precautions are observed, including the wearing of life jackets in boats or on skiis at all times.

A wide choice of activities is offered.























AT THE RIFLE RANGE — We have one of the most popular activities. Skills and safety are taught by certified National Rifle Association Instructors. Campers are awarded proficiency certificates, since Waupaca is a member of the N.R.A.
